#### Vulnerable children

Carlton County sees a need for parents to receive support with the difficult job of raising children. Many parents don't have supportive, extended family as families have had in the past. Carlton County has Family School Support workers who are county workers who have offices in the public schools. They are able to provide families with Family Based Crisis services. Once the crisis has been stabilized, some families go on to Family Based Case Management Services.

We also have a Diversion program – a social worker who works with families who have pre-delinquent or delinquent youth. Family Based/Diversion services can be provided as a crisis service and also as

ongoing Family Based Case Management services to help these families improve their family functioning and ability to meet the needs of their teens.

#### Vulnerable children

Carlton County possesses many strengths. One of our strengths is our ability to communicate well not only within the agency but with other community agencies and providers such as our Domestic Abuse Advocates, the County Attorney's Office, our area law enforcement agencies – Sheriff's Department, Cloquet Police Department, Fond du Lac Police Department, Moose Lake Police Department and Esko Police Department. We communicate well with our schools and have FSSW in many of the county's schools. We meet every other week with our Probation officers and Truancy Officer. We have almost daily contact with our Tribe during our Action Team calls. We also have monthly ICWA and quarterly dialogue meetings with Fond du Lac, Probation, Carlton County Human Services, and the County Attorney's Office. We continue to have bi-weekly Child Protection Team meetings and opposite week Case Consultation Team meetings.

Carlton County has been willing to be on the forefront of new ways of providing child protection services. Carlton County was one of the first counties to engage in the Alternative Response/Family Assessment Response programming. We were also one of the early counties do provide Parent Support Outreach Programming. We developed our Children and Family Services Collaborative over 10 years ago and it continues to meet to assess needs and look at creative service delivery despite the evaporation of collaborative monies. Through our Collaborative we were able to develop a variety of programs including Family School Support Worker Program, School-Linked Mental Health, Truancy Officer, Coordinated School Health, Crisis Nursery, and Restorative Justice – Sentencing Circles.
